

1. Korean Studies Working Group in Heidelberg

Heidelberg University has a long-standing reputation as a prominent center for East Asian Studies in Europe, particularly in the fields of Chinese and Japanese Studies, as well as East Asian Art History. While a formal institution dedicated solely to Korean Studies has not yet been established at the University, Korea has consistently captivated the interest of researchers across various disciplines, including social sciences, politics, and art history.



The Korean Studies Working Group in Heidelberg was informally founded in 2011 to foster the exchange of ideas concerning Korea-related teaching and research initiatives at the university. Starting from 2014, the Chair of Contemporary Chinese Studies has been expanded to encompass social science research in the realm of Korea and Japan. This shift has significantly contributed to research and instructional undertakings in the study contemporary Korea. Moreover,

establishment of the Centre for Asian and Transcultural Studies (CATS) in 2019 has invigorated the aspiration to develop further research on Korea. This development has introduced an interdisciplinary and transcultural perspective that has been seamlessly integrated into the broader context of East Asian Studies at Heidelberg University.

In the realm of teaching activities, the Korea Foundation has graciously sponsored a lecturer position for language courses since 2012. Each year, four different levels are offered: Korean I and Korean III, typically conducted during the winter semesters, and Korean II and Korean IV, which are generally available in the summer semesters. From 2016 onward, a range of Korea-related courses and seminars have been delivered, covering sociological, political, and historical perspectives, and led by our dedicated researchers and professors. Furthermore, the financial support from the Academy of Korean Studies (AKS) since 2019 has allowed us to expand the breadth of our teaching activities by inviting esteemed guest professors (photo above by Xiaoying Jin, Heidelberg University).

During the preceding Summer Semester of 2023, notable main seminars in the field of Korean Studies were offered. "Foreign Policy of the Republic of Korea: Past and Present" was led by Juhee Jeong, and another seminar titled "East Asian International Relations: Korean Peninsula and Beyond" was instructed by Dr. In Young Min.

2. Ostasien Aktuell (East Asia Today)

"East Asia Today" (Ostasien Aktuell) is a regular series of lectures and discussions organised by Prof. Dr. Anja Senz and her team at the Institute of East Asian Studies at the Heidelberg University on political, economic and social developments in the Chinese-speaking world as well as in Japan and Korea. After the delegation from Konkuk University's Academy of Mobility Humanities visited Heidelberg in the previous year, two of our research members had the privilege to reciprocate the visit to Konkuk University in the current year. On May 31st, Dr. Jaok Kwon from the Centre for Asian and Transcultural

Studies was warmly invited as a guest lecturer by the Academy of Mobility Humanities at Konkuk University. During the visit, she delivered a thought-provoking presentation titled "Migration Policy in Germany and the Changing Sociodemographics of Korean Immigrants".



On August 2nd, one of our doctoral research members, Xiaoying Jin, from Heidelberg, was extended an invitation as a guest to take part in a colloquium organized by Konkuk University's Academy of Mobility Humanities.

Publication Grant (The Academy of Korean Studies, 2023-2024)

Dr. Jaok Kwon has been awarded a publication grant by the Academy of Korean Studies for a collaborative project titled 'Transnational Civic Engagements and Identity Formation among Korean Migrants in Germany.' This endeavor involves Dr. Sang Hui Nam from Bamberg University. The project's primary aim is to publish a special issue in *ASIEN: The German Journal of Contemporary Asia*, one of the most esteemed journals in the realm of Asian Studies in Germany. The special issue will delve into the subject of transnational civic engagements among Korean migrants in Germany and will bring together researchers from diverse disciplines within the humanities and social sciences across Germany. The overarching goal of this initiative is to commemorate the 140th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between Korea and Germany in 2023.
